2 THE COURT: And we have one more.

3 THE CLERK: One more.

4 THE COURT: Both sides are here?

5 THE CLERK: Oyola/Moreno. Okay.

6 THE COURT: Both sides, come on up. Both raise  
7 your right hand. The Clerk will swear both of you  
8 in.

9 THE CLERK: Do you solemnly swear or solemnly  
10 and sincerely affirm, as the case may be, that the  
11 evidence concerning this case will be the truth, the  
12 whole truth, and nothing but the truth so help you  
13 God or upon penalty of perjury.

14 THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

15 THE DEFENDANT: Yes.

16 THE CLERK: Please state your name and address  
17 for the record starting with you, ma'am.

18 THE PLAINTIFF: Adrianne Oyola, 1185 Randolph  
19 Road, Middletown, Connecticut.

20 THE CLERK: Sir.

21 THE DEFENDANT: Tony Moreno, 155 Skyler Avenue,  
22 Middletown, Connecticut.

23 THE COURT: All right. You are the applicant in  
24 this case; right?

25 THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

26 THE COURT: What's your relationship to Mr.  
27 Moreno?

1 THE PLAINTIFF: He was my boyfriend.

2 THE COURT: All right. And tell me why you  
3 believe you are under continuous threat of present  
4 physical pain, physical injury, stalking, or pattern  
5 of threatening.

6 THE PLAINTIFF: He did break the restraining  
7 order a few days ago saying his friend --

8 THE COURT: There's a restraining order in  
9 effect?

10 THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah.

11 THE COURT: What -- did he --

12 THE PLAINTIFF: He broke -- he broke it and --

13 THE COURT: He got arrested?

14 THE PLAINTIFF: No, he's here. I don't know  
15 if --

16 THE COURT: When you say he broke a restraining  
17 order, where is the restraining order?

18 THE PLAINTIFF: It's right here.

19 THE COURT: This one?

20 THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah.

21 THE COURT: The one that was -- the one that was  
22 granted by Judge Domnarski?

23 THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah.

24 THE COURT: Okay. When you say he broke it,  
25 what happened? Did you call the police when he broke  
26 it?

27 THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah. They took down the

1 information, and they file everything, and they put  
2 out a warrant into the court. I don't know if it's  
3 effective or not.

4 THE COURT: Okay. So what day did that happen?

5 THE PLAINTIFF: I believe it was a Friday. This  
6 Friday.

7 THE COURT: This past Friday.

8 THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

9 THE COURT: So you were in court on June -- on  
10 June 17<sup>th</sup>, which was Wednesday. So he would have  
11 been -- this would have happened on the 26<sup>th</sup>?

12 THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

13 THE COURT: What happened on the 26<sup>th</sup>?

14 THE PLAINTIFF: His friend contacted me and told  
15 me that his mother, or her mother, was sick and  
16 wanted to see me and the baby. I was, oh, okay.

17 So she picked me up that morning. We got there,  
18 and I went to go look for the mom. I couldn't find  
19 them, and then he comes around the corner and tells  
20 me you need to sit down. You need to calm down. I  
21 need to talk to you. Tells me to give him my phone.  
22 I gave him my phone.

23 He, you know, tells me to sit down. I was,  
24 like, no, I want to leave. I don't want to be here.  
25 He was, like, well, you need to calm down or you're  
26 going to go to jail, and then he went on telling me  
27 why I had to go to jail, and told me that, basically,

1           if I don't -- the lawyer told him that if I don't  
2           make him happy today with the court, the decision and  
3           everything, that the lawyer would put me in jail for  
4           a year.

5           THE COURT:   The lawyer will put you in jail.

6           THE PLAINTIFF:   Yes, and that I needed to,  
7           basically, make him happy today.

8           THE COURT:   So you have a child together.

9           THE PLAINTIFF:   Yes.   Seven months old.

10          THE COURT:   Okay.   And what happened prior to  
11          June 17<sup>th</sup> that made you come to court?

12          THE PLAINTIFF:   Multiple things.   He's just very  
13          abusive, not physically, but mentally.   He's  
14          constantly send -- calling me names, constantly  
15          shoving me around and just abusive.

16          THE COURT:   When you say shoving you around,  
17          that's not physically abusive?

18          THE PLAINTIFF:   Well, it is, but I -- abuse,  
19          physical abuse, I would think it as, like, punching  
20          me, slapping me around.

21          THE COURT:   So pushing you is not physical  
22          abuse?

23          THE PLAINTIFF:   It's a form.   I guess it's a  
24          form of it, I guess.

25          THE COURT:   Of course, it is.   So explain to me  
26          when that happened.

27          THE PLAINTIFF:   Multiple times throughout the

1           years that we've been together.

2           THE COURT: All right. But what made you come  
3 to court on June 17<sup>th</sup>? What was the straw that broke  
4 the camel's --

5           THE PLAINTIFF: Basically, my graduation from  
6 high school was the 16<sup>th</sup>, and we got into an  
7 argument, I guess. He took both of my graduation  
8 dresses, hid them. I didn't know where they were.  
9 So his mother took me to buy another outfit for my  
10 graduation.

11           The next day, I saw him and asked him why did he  
12 take them. He was, like, I thought it would be  
13 funny. I got mad, and then he was, like, you -- you  
14 two can go to lunch with your father. I was, 'like,  
15 okay. When I tried to take my son with me, he said,  
16 no, you're not taking him with that attitude. I'm,  
17 like, I don't have an attitude. I'm just irritated,  
18 and he was, like, well, you're not taking him, and  
19 then when I tried to take my son, he pushed my hands  
20 away telling me I'm not taking him.

21           THE COURT: Well, who does Aaden live with?

22           THE PLAINTIFF: Right now, with me.

23           THE COURT: Did you have any court order with  
24 regard to that?

25           THE PLAINTIFF: No.

26           THE COURT: Okay. So --

27           THE PLAINTIFF: Well, in the restraining order,

1           it says I get temporary custody until today.

2           THE COURT: No, I understand that, but prior to  
3           that, there was no court order.

4           THE PLAINTIFF: No.

5           THE COURT: And you were living together?

6           THE PLAINTIFF: Uh-huh.

7           THE COURT: Where?

8           THE PLAINTIFF: On the 155 Skyler Avenue.

9           THE COURT: And whose house is that? His --

10          THE PLAINTIFF: His mother's.

11          THE COURT: His -- so you were living at his  
12          mother's house?

13          THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

14          THE COURT: And where are you living now?

15          THE PLAINTIFF: My sister's house.

16          THE COURT: So you moved with the baby to your  
17          sister's house.

18          THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

19          THE COURT: And you're saying that something  
20          happened at -- do you have a custody case pending  
21          between the two of you?

22          THE PLAINTIFF: No.

23          THE COURT: Nothing. Okay. And so, and you're  
24          19 years old.

25          THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

26          THE COURT: And he's 21.

27          THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

1           THE COURT: And so, but -- so he hid your dress.  
2           Okay. You went with his mother to buy a new dress.  
3           He said that he did it as a joke, and then what  
4           happened?

5           THE PLAINTIFF: I told him I'm going to take my  
6           son to lunch with my father down the street to  
7           Illiano's. He didn't let me. So I got -- he --  
8           there were multiple times.

9           THE COURT: What do you mean he wouldn't let  
10          you?

11          THE PLAINTIFF: He wouldn't let me take my son.  
12          Like, he was -- the bed was -- you know, he was on  
13          the bed. My son was on the inside. He was wrapped  
14          around on the outside, and he, basically, told me I  
15          can't take my son. I was, like, well, I want him to  
16          go spend some time with my father. I went to go grab  
17          my son and he pushed my hand away and telling me no.

18          THE COURT: Okay. Then what happened?

19          THE PLAINTIFF: I called the cops and told them,  
20          and they came down trying to talk some sense into  
21          him. When they went down there, he was gone, and  
22          then they told me --

23          THE COURT: And then what did you do?

24          THE PLAINTIFF: I went down to the court and I  
25          filed for the restraining order.

26          THE COURT: Did you -- you didn't take your son  
27          and go to dinner with your father?



1           THE PLAINTIFF: No, he wouldn't let me. He  
2 physically would not let me.

3           THE COURT: Well, where was your son?

4           THE PLAINTIFF: With him.

5           THE COURT: Okay. So, so when -- so when he  
6 pushed your hand away, he then took your son and went  
7 away. You didn't tell me that part.

8           THE PLAINTIFF: He was -- he never -- when I was  
9 trying to take my son, he was on the bed. He did not  
10 move from the bed --

11          THE COURT: Who's he?

12          THE PLAINTIFF: -- and then I left. Tony  
13 Moreno.

14          THE COURT: Tony was on the bed with your son.  
15 He was hold --

16          THE PLAINTIFF: And then I tried -- I tried to  
17 walk away with my son and he wouldn't let me. I was,  
18 like, I want to take my --

19          THE COURT: So you tried to take your son from  
20 him?

21          THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah. And he wouldn't let me.

22          THE COURT: And he said no.

23          THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah.

24          THE COURT: Okay.

25          THE PLAINTIFF: He's done that multiple times.  
26 If he doesn't want me taking my son somewhere, he  
27 doesn't let me, but he's --

1 THE COURT: Okay, but that's why you got sep --

2 THE PLAINTIFF: -- allowed to take him anywhere.

3 THE COURT: So why are you guys still -- why  
4 were you still living together? Why were you still  
5 living there?

6 THE PLAINTIFF: 'Cause I had at the time nowhere  
7 else to go. I was, basically, there as --

8 THE COURT: Okay.

9 THE PLAINTIFF: Until I could find another place  
10 to live, and then my sister offered her room in the  
11 house to go and stay there for up to three months  
12 until I can get everything situated with housing and  
13 my money in order.

14 THE COURT: All right. This is not a custody  
15 case. This is a restraining order case.

16 THE PLAINTIFF: Yes.

17 THE COURT: And you have to be in continuous  
18 threat of present physical pain, physical injury,  
19 stalking, or a pattern of threatening. You two have  
20 a custody dispute, a visitation dispute. Are you  
21 afraid he's going to come over and beat you up?

22 THE PLAINTIFF: Sometimes. I've had multiple  
23 times where cars just stop in the front of the house,  
24 and multiple times where I feel like he's -- I feel  
25 like he's always there, and it's creepy. He, he knew  
26 where my sister was when I didn't even know where my  
27 sister was. He texted me and told me, you know, are

1           you on Newfield? My -- with your sister, and I was,  
2           like, I, I -- I was home. So I don't know how he  
3           knew my sister was on Newfield.

4           THE COURT: When did he kick you out of bed when  
5           you had a fractured ankle? How long was that?

6           THE PLAINTIFF: It was a few months ago. I  
7           don't know the exact date.

8           THE COURT: Give me a ballpark.

9           THE PLAINTIFF: Um --

10          THE COURT: Before or after the baby was born?

11          THE PLAINTIFF: After, way after. My son was  
12          about six months old when that happened.

13          THE COURT: You said he would hurt your child.  
14          You said that you fear for your child's safety. He  
15          could hurt my child. He has told my child to shut up  
16          if he's making too much noise. He told his mom to  
17          watch him if he does not feel up to it. He left my  
18          son on the bed upstairs to cry and completely left  
19          the house. When did that happen?

20          THE PLAINTIFF: I don't know the exact date. I  
21          believe it was sometime in -- it was, it was  
22          somewhere around the -- April or May. Somewhere  
23          around there.

24          THE COURT: You say you don't know where your  
25          son is. You know where he is -- you said you didn't  
26          know your --

27          THE PLAINTIFF: At the time, I didn't know where

1 my son was when I wrote this.

2 THE COURT: He was with his father; right?

3 THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah, but I didn't know where.

4 THE COURT: What's your side of the story?

5 THE DEFENDANT: Starting from which point?

6 THE COURT: I guess, I guess from when the baby  
7 was born.

8 THE DEFENDANT: Okay. It was starting the day  
9 that she went and got the -- is it a restraining  
10 order or a protection order?

11 THE COURT: She got a restraining order on June  
12 17<sup>th</sup>.

13 THE DEFENDANT: Okay. So that day, we had  
14 been -- we stopped at her dad's house. He had  
15 something to go do, so he wanted to go to lunch with  
16 us later. So we agreed. We were walking. She  
17 wasn't being very pleasant. I was -- so I told her,  
18 I was, like, if you're going to keep being like this,  
19 I was, I'm not going anywhere with you. You can tell  
20 your dad it's going to be just you. For some reason,  
21 she thought just you meant her and the baby.

22 So we walked around for ten/fifteen minutes  
23 longer, went back to my mom's house. I took the baby  
24 upstairs, sat upstairs for about twenty minutes, and  
25 she didn't come inside. So I texted her, asked her  
26 if she would bring the baby back up. She's, like,  
27 why would I bring him up if we're leaving? I was,

1           like, no. I said you can go. I don't want him going  
2           with you when you're being like this. So then she's,  
3           like, he's coming with me. I was, like, not when  
4           you're being like this.

5           Then she came upstairs and started getting  
6           louder and referencing, I'm taking my son, and I was,  
7           like, if you're going to keep being like that, I  
8           don't want him going with you, and then she walked  
9           out. So I texted her. I was, like, are you calm  
10          yet? She said she didn't want to talk to me, so, all  
11          right. Fine.

12          Then she came up. Came storming in the room and  
13          tried to take him. So I put my hand in the way. I  
14          was, like, you need to relax before you take him.  
15          She was, like, no, give me my bleeping son. I was,  
16          like, not when you're being like this and stuff.

17          She got mad. Took the necklace I bought, the  
18          ring, and a couple of bracelets off, threw them down  
19          next to where I was and then stormed out. Didn't  
20          come back upstairs for about ten/fifteen minutes. So  
21          then, apparently, she had left.

22          So then, my mom left. So I went downstairs.  
23          Nobody was there. So I took the baby and started  
24          walking around the block assuming she went to lunch.  
25          So I walked down to Illiano's. They weren't there.  
26          So I didn't know where she was.

27          So I then started walking back towards my house.

1 I ran into my cousin. Well, not by blood, but we  
2 grew up together. So I was talking to her, and she  
3 was, oh, you know, my mom wants to see the baby.  
4 Whatever, whatever. And, oh, previous to me leaving  
5 my house, my phone fell down the stairs so my screen  
6 was destroyed. So I did shut my phone off because  
7 there was no way I could have used it. I was trying  
8 to touch it, but it was doing its own thing. My  
9 phone was broken. So I turned it off.

10 So I went with her --

11 THE COURT: Did you get a new phone since then?

12 THE DEFENDANT: Yes. So I went with her to --  
13 then we went to her mom's house. We were hanging out  
14 for -- I was there for, maximum, two hours.

15 THE COURT: They have a phone on -- they have a  
16 landline?

17 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah.

18 THE COURT: Do they have a -- somebody else in  
19 the house have a cell phone?

20 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah. They had a phone. So  
21 when I was --

22 THE COURT: So why -- why didn't you call?

23 THE DEFENDANT: I assumed she was mad and just  
24 walking and stuff, and there was plenty of ways for  
25 her to contact me.

26 THE COURT: How?

27 THE DEFENDANT: She didn't try any of them.

1 THE COURT: She didn't know where you were.

2 THE DEFENDANT: She could have contacted my mom.

3 My mom -- she --

4 THE COURT: Your mom didn't know where you --

5 THE DEFENDANT: -- knows everybody I normally  
6 hang out with.

7 THE COURT: Your mom didn't know where you were.

8 THE DEFENDANT: But everybody --

9 THE COURT: No one knew where you were.

10 THE DEFENDANT: Everybody can reach out and  
11 somebody will tell you where I am. Everybody can  
12 always find me. It's not hard.

13 But, so somebody had sent my cousin a  
14 screenshot, a picture of what they saw on Facebook,  
15 and oh, did you know Tony's baby is on Facebook?  
16 They're saying he stole him. This was after me being  
17 gone for two hours. So then there was a picture of  
18 me. Oh, if you see him with this man -- no point in  
19 time did they refer to me as his father. It was just  
20 this man. You know, and then they were going on  
21 saying, oh, Middletown Police can't do anything for  
22 twenty-four hours. As soon as we saw that --

23 THE COURT: We have a paternity acknowledgment  
24 signed at the hospital?

25 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah. So as soon as we saw  
26 that, I called my mom. I was, like, what's going on?  
27 She's like, the cops just left. Apparently, she went

1 and got a restraining order because she was mad.  
2 This and that. So you have to bring the baby back.  
3 I was okay. Well, this is where I am. Come pick me  
4 up.

5 So as soon as she came to pick me up, we went to  
6 the Ninety-Nine in Cromwell because my brother was in  
7 the car. So, you know, I -- the whole way there, we  
8 were talking. We sat in the parking lot for about  
9 ten/fifteen minutes talking -- I was trying to figure  
10 out what was going on.

11 THE COURT: Who's we?

12 THE DEFENDANT: Me and my mom.

13 THE COURT: Yeah.

14 THE DEFENDANT: And then, she said, you know,  
15 base -- like, she showed me the papers that had got  
16 dropped off at the house. So I read them, and she  
17 was, like, basically, you know, we have to bring the  
18 baby. You know, you don't have to come. I can bring  
19 the baby, you know, to the police station or wherever  
20 she went. I'm not sure where she went after that.  
21 Me and my brother went inside. She left with the  
22 baby. That was about it.

23 And as far as me violating the protection order  
24 on Friday, I wasn't in town on Friday. So I'm not  
25 sure how I did that.

26 THE COURT: Where were you on Friday?

27 THE DEFENDANT: I was at my sister's house in



1 New Britain. So --

2 THE COURT: All day?

3 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah.

4 THE COURT: How did you get there?

5 THE DEFENDANT: I got dropped off by a friend.

6 THE COURT: Who?

7 THE DEFENDANT: Alyssa Rodriguez [phonetic].

8 THE COURT: So --

9 THE DEFENDANT: The same person she got in the  
10 car with. I believe it was a day previous and stuff.  
11 She had been with this person. Friday, I was in New  
12 Britain.

13 THE COURT: From what time to what time?

14 THE DEFENDANT: From around 8:30 in the morning  
15 until about 10:00 o'clock at night, and I have people  
16 that can verify that. I never left her house.

17 THE COURT: She says you pushed her off the bed.  
18 Did you push her or shove her?

19 THE DEFENDANT: So that particular night and  
20 stuff, we had -- we weren't exactly arguing, but  
21 she -- she throws temper tantrums, so I was ignoring  
22 her. So I had headphones in, and she had been  
23 sitting on the inside of the bed with the baby, and  
24 she kept pushing my legs aggressively. So I just  
25 kept straightening them back out and putting them  
26 back on the bed. She kept pushing them off the side  
27 of the bed, and I, you know, didn't want to argue

1 with her. I just kept putting my legs back. The  
2 last -- after doing it, like, six times, the last  
3 time I straightened out my legs, she happened to be  
4 sitting there, and I kicked her off the bed, and I  
5 asked her, are you okay? She then -- now, with her  
6 fractured ankle, then got up and started kicking  
7 things around the room and throwing stuff like a  
8 three-year old. So I'm not sure how that works out  
9 with a fractured ankle. I assume that would hurt.

10 THE COURT: Do you have a job?

11 THE DEFENDANT: Yes.

12 THE COURT: What do you do?

13 THE DEFENDANT: I work for my uncle doing --  
14 he's a general contractor. So I'm -- I think,  
15 technically, my title would be a laborer. So I,  
16 basically, do whatever is --

17 THE COURT: Did you graduate high school?

18 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah. Well, not high school. I  
19 went and got my GED shortly after leaving high  
20 school.

21 THE COURT: So you got your GED?

22 THE DEFENDANT: Yeah.

23 THE COURT: So you two don't have a real good  
24 relationship.

25 THE DEFENDANT: We did, but when she gets angry  
26 and stuff, she -- that's it. She's just -- whenever  
27 she doesn't get her way, she throws temper tantrums

1           because that's not the first time she's sat there  
2           throwing stuff around. There -- the people who live  
3           with us, and stuff, can tell you over the past year,  
4           she always has fits. She gets mad whenever I don't  
5           give her her way.

6           THE COURT: So where do your folks live?

7           THE PLAINTIFF: My mom, she lives in Waterbury,  
8           and my father lives in Middletown, South Main Street.

9           THE COURT: And you can't live with either one  
10          of them?

11          THE PLAINTIFF: No.

12          THE COURT: How come?

13          THE PLAINTIFF: My mother has a one bedroom and  
14          my father has a one bedroom.

15          THE COURT: And where does your sister live?

16          THE PLAINTIFF: 1185 Randolph Road.

17          THE COURT: And was -- well, how big is her  
18          place?

19          THE PLAINTIFF: I'm sorry. What?

20          THE COURT: How big is her place?

21          THE PLAINTIFF: It's a three-bedroom, I believe.  
22          Three bedroom.

23          THE COURT: And who lives there besides the two  
24          of you?

25          THE PLAINTIFF: Her husband, her son, my sister.  
26          Those are the only people that live there. So my two  
27          sisters, my brother-in-law, and my nephew.

1           THE COURT: So a big, big crowd of people. I'm  
2 just not convinced that there's a continuous threat  
3 of present physical pain or physical injury.

4           I think the two of you don't have a good  
5 relationship, and you need to get -- somebody needs  
6 to go downstairs and file a custody application, and  
7 you need to work out a parental rights agreement  
8 where the child is going to be, when the child is  
9 going to be with mom, when the child is going to be  
10 with dad, work out a child support order. If he's  
11 working, you know, get a child support order. Is the  
12 child on HUSKY?

13          THE PLAINTIFF: Yeah.

14          THE COURT: So the child is on HUSKY. So, I  
15 mean, you know -- so there's health insurance, but  
16 you need to work out -- you need to -- you know,  
17 there's chaos in your relationship. I'm not  
18 satisfied that this -- that he's -- that you're in  
19 imminent fear, in imminent harm that he's going to  
20 come over and, you know, cause you physical harm or  
21 physical violence.

22          I'm just not convinced that that's going to  
23 happen particularly if you're not living together any  
24 more, and it sounds like you're not living together  
25 any more, but you do need to work out a parenting  
26 plan where you know when the baby is going to be with  
27 mommy and when the baby is going to be with daddy,

1 and you go downstairs to the Clerk's Office and do  
2 that. File the paperwork. It's a custody  
3 application. If you're -- if you have no income, you  
4 can waive the filing fee. You can have the Marshal's  
5 fees paid for by the State, and you can serve him  
6 with the papers, and then you can just work out a --  
7 work that out, but it sounds to me as though your  
8 relationship, unfortunately, is over, and your child  
9 is going to grow up with a mom living in one house  
10 and a dad living in another house. It sounds to me  
11 as though that's what's going to happen, I mean,  
12 because it's unfortunate, but you don't -- it doesn't  
13 sound to me as though that this is a relationship  
14 that would -- that's healthy to have a child grow up  
15 in.

16 I don't know whether the two of you are mature  
17 enough at this present time to have an adult  
18 relationship. You know, the behavior that both  
19 of you talked to me about is behavior that, you  
20 know, teenagers -- you know, you're 21, but, you  
21 know, you're talking -- you're not giving me grown-up  
22 behavior. You're giving me child -- you know, so.

23 So in any event, the restraining order -- I  
24 guess this is something I need to sign; right?

25 THE CLERK: Yes, Your Honor.

26 THE COURT: I'm not going to -- so I'm not going  
27 to grant the restraining order. It's -- the orders

1           are vacated. You need to go downstairs and work out  
2           custody and visitation.

3           Okay. And when you are in contact with each  
4           other, which is permissible, unless he gets arrested  
5           for violating that order, and if he's telling the  
6           truth and if he was in New Britain, and then someone  
7           made a -- and it happened on the Friday, as you say,  
8           if that was a complaint made to the police, you could  
9           be arrested for violating that order and that's a  
10          felony. You can go to jail for five years, and they  
11          may deal with it that way. If you have proof you  
12          were in New Britain that whole day -- I mean, she  
13          says it happened on that day -- then she could be in  
14          trouble for making a false report. I'm not sure  
15          exactly what the story is because I don't know how  
16          it's going to play out.

17          But in any event, the two of you need to figure  
18          this out for the sake of your child. You decided  
19          to -- whether you decided to make a baby or you just  
20          made a baby, it doesn't make any difference. You're  
21          parents now. Okay? And if you want your child to  
22          grow up to be healthy and well, you need to grow up  
23          and deal with each other as adults, and you're not  
24          doing that right now. You're dealing with each other  
25          like you're children. I'm sorry to say that, but you  
26          are. So I wish you well. Good luck.
